
## Top three seniors at Coventry graduate tonight

COVENTRY—The top three graduating seniors in the Class of '11 will walk tall tonight at their ceremonies, consummating the end of a four year academic experience at Coventry High School.

Christopher Masse, the valedictorian, Stephen Pratt, the salutatorian, and Nicholas Paiva, ranked third in the class, all have nothing but praise for their high school experiences and exude their enthusiasm for the years to come.

Throughout high school, Masse spent much of his time running cross country. He also considers the memories with his friends a significant part of his four years at the school.

Masse stated that cross country has not only enabled him to meet new people, but also to "learn a lot about time management and dedication."

Extracurricular activities amongst the three students were significant factors to what they believe made their high school experience so special. "The extracurricular [activities] have made me want to network, reach out to people and not be shy to talk to them," said Pratt. Masse explained that his English classes have pushed him to improve his public speaking abilities and helped him to become more outgoing.

Boston College and will major in finance at the Carroll School of Management.

Paiva explained that after college, he is interested in fossil fuels and looking at alternative fuel sources.

"I want to look at more efficient means of using fuel, to get better gas mileage, for example," he said. "Wind power and solar power are all interesting to me as we deplete our resources."

Since Pratt was young, he dreamed that he would design theme park rides with the engineering department at Walt Disney, designing the hotels, cruises or rides. He expressed that if those plans failed, he would be interested in military airplanes.

"I'd like to design future fighter jets," said Pratt.

Masse said he plans to take a variety of finance and business classes first before deciding what career he would like to fully pursue.

Masse, Pratt and Paiva are all enthusiastic for what college will bring, but will also miss the relationships and experiences they had at Coventry High School.

"It's a double-edged blade," said Masse. "I'm going to miss my friends but look forward to college."
