Aside from achieving her outstanding grades, Malaree participated in various clubs and activities during her time at CHS including Interact, Yearbook, History and World Language clubs, Envirothon, Show Choir and Concert Chorus. Malaree plans to study secondary education and biology at <u>Salve Regina University</u> in the fall and may even attempt a degree in Environmental Science - a subject that she has earned multiple Early Enrollment Program (EEP) credits in from CHS.
