Officer Drew Ferguson.


The program is a partnership of students, teachers and industry working together to ensure America has a skilled workforce by providing education programs, events and competition that support career and technical education (CTE) in the nation's classrooms and the most recent SkillsUSA annual competition took place in March at the Community College of Rhode Island over the course of the month, ranging in 10 to 12 areas including healthcare, medical math, carpentry, graphic arts, various technologies and automotive industry, to name a few.

Cole learned about the program through a teacher and as soon as she found out about it, she hit the books, studying all medical terminology.

"I've been working at it since September and I'm ready to go to nationals in Kentucky but I'm nervous," she

The judges at the national level include professors at the college level as well as professionals in their fields and students who take part are also at the high school and college level.

"I think I wanted to be involved to motivate myself," said Menezes, who already has early college acceptance and is interested in basic healthcare. "As part of the competition, you also have to do a presentation and are evaluated on your skills and how well you perform basic healthcare skills. I was a patient volunteer last year, so I had the advantage going into the event this year of at least having an idea of what would be expected of me and I had just completed an anatomy course in school, so when I took that test the information was already learned where I
