Coventry honors its 2013 Teacher of the Year

Tara D'Alano of Tiogue Elementary honored at annual Coventry staff welcoming program

COVENTRY - She was so shocked, it took her quite a time for her to get her bearings after she accepted her

golden apple.
"I can't believe it," said Tara
D'Alano, who was named 2013
Coventry Teacher of the Year during
the Best of Coventry annual staff welcoming program held in the Coventry
High School auditorium Monday
morning. "It's always someone else. I

never in a million years expected it to be me."

A full auditorium of teachers, administration and school staff welcomed her with heavy applause and open arms after Coventry School Superin-

tendent Michael Convery made the announcement.

"When I was a child, I wanted to be just like my dad," she said, "who was also a teacher who has recently retired."

D'Alano has been teaching for more than 20 years. She began her career shortly after she graduated from Coventry High School in 1988. She was a resource teacher for the third, fourth and fifth grade at another school. Currently, she teaches third grade at Tiogue Elementary School.

She has learned after her many years of being at the head of the classroom, that each child has their own style of learning. Her job, she said, is to bring out the best in each child by recognizing that style.

"The most important role in my mind is to be a leader and a caring personality," said D'Alano. "You've got to embrace everyone's learning style and bring it forward. You do that by combining different types of instruction: games, textbooks, hands-on ac-

tivities."

One of the main challenges she faces each day in teaching, she said, is covering the large amount of material.

"This is certainly not unique to my classroom," she said. "You feel like you're always racing to get to each child and do everything."
