## Super says Coventry's action plan moving quickly

COVENTRY – According to Coventry Superintendent Mike Almeida, the construction for the school district's action plan is moving at a quick pace.

"Everything is in the process," said Almeida, who has been very busy visiting all the schools in Coventry over the last few weeks to discuss safety measures with administration and teachers. "We've already been out to the schools to take measurements for the doors and are asking our current vendors to help us upgrade all our systems to be in accordance with our nine-point action plan."

This plan includes restructuring the front office entrance ways at the elementary schools and middle school to create a vestibule where visitors will have restricted access to the building while being checkedin to the school, improving the access to panic buttons which send immediate notification to police and fire departments, having identification badges for all employees, installing surveillance monitors in the front office at all schools so staff can identify visitors more clearly and monitors will record in color, a new intercom system will be installed at Western Elementary School, a new surveillance system will be installed at the High School because the high school has challenges due to its size and layout, lockdown and evacuation procedures will be reviewed and revised as necessary, outside entry-way barriers we be strategically positioned at some schools to prevent vehicles from approaching front doors and all non-instructional areas such as the cafeteria, will be outfitted with locking doors.

The Superintendent's goal is to complete the upgrades in the most cost-effective manner possible.

"We're utilizing the same companies we already work with to provide the upgrades," he said. "The first thing we will see complete are the panic buttons," he said, "the next step we're working on is taking measurements for

the doors, given the doors in all the schools are not uniform."
