Teacher contract extended one year

Union, district agree to hold line on salaries for this year

COVENTRY — After working over the summer to reach an agreement, members of the Coventry Teachers' Alliance (CTA) and the Coventry School District have decided to extend the teachers' contract for another year, with no pay increases with the exception of step increases, which are mandated by law.

"We're building a lot of trust and we're able to focus on what's really important and that's the kids," said Coventry School Superintendent Craig Levis. We're honoring the step increases but no raises," he confirmed.

Levis said there could be other additions to the budget that cannot be accounted for right now, that can add a couple hundred thousand, such as healthcare costs, but he called such possible increases "fluid."

"The union doesn't have to do this and we call it good faith on their part and it allows us to focus on student performance and concentrate of the strategic plan," he said.

Coventry School Committee Chairwoman Kathy Patenude is very pleased the CTA was in agreement and credited Levis with working so well with so many relationships.

"It gives our new administrators, especially the Superintendent, another year to get to know the contract and this way, he can really see what parts of it are worth fighting for and what is worth letting go," she said.

Kelly Erinakes, president of the Coventry Teachers' Alliance, said the teachers ook forward to creating a longrange plan for the schools, now that all administrators are in place and will have the additional time to get their bearings.

Among other issues addressed at this week's meeting were as follows:

Committee Chairwoman
Norma Smith announced that

"We met with our principals and I wan to make sure they're involved and make sure we have everything in line and as we go forward, we'll meet with each principal."
