Commissioner visits local schools

COVENTRY — The state education commissioner has a goal to visit all school districts in the state.

To that end, Deborah Gist, the commissioner of education, visited the Coventry schools, interacting with students and teachers.

Gist just became commissioner this July. As part of her 100 day visit to schools in the area, she visited Coventry High School, Alan Shawn Feinstein Middle School and Tiogue Elementary School on Friday.

During her visit to Coventry, Gist traveled throughout the schools and

mingled in classrooms, interacting with teachers and students. She sat down and talked to students about their lessons. She would stop and take an interest in what each teacher was doing and talk to them about it.

"I'm doing this because I'm new to the state," Gist said. "This is a great way to know the communities better and meet people."
