Students nervous, excited to be back

COVENTRY — Yesterday officially marked the end of summer for youngsters in Coventry as they all began their first day of school.

High school students were the first to take the plunge, gathering at Coventry High School before 7 a.m. yesterday.


Students gathered inside and outside the building, with a large group clustering outside the school's cafeteria.

The school resource officer, Jay Burlingame, and the school principal, Michael Hobin, had to usher the students into the building just before the bell rang to kick off the first official day at 7:20 a.m.

Hobin said things appeared to be moving rather smoothly "for the first day of school." He said that for some of the kids, especially those who had never been to the building before, there was some obvious apprehension, but that there were no problems overall.

"We will have a short advisory period this morning, and then it's onto the first day's rotation periods," Hobin said. "We will also be on a normal bell schedule by Wednesday.

"Today, of course, the kids are just getting used to things, so there will be some transition periods, many of these students are here at the school for the first time, but it will not take long to get them into the routine," he said.

Maranda Dailey and Michaela Metcalf, both freshman at the high school, admitted to being a bit nervous about the new environment, but appeared to find solace in recognizing friends who had arrived at the school shortly after them.

They too then filtered into the lunchroom with the other students upon the administrator's instruction.

Just a few miles up the street, at the Alan Shawn Feinstein Middle School of Coventry, another group of students were also adjusting to a new routine.

All sixth grade students were joining the upper class seventh and eighth grade students at the middle school. Marilin Hammond and Madisen Kearney were among this group and they both said they arrived at school feeling a bit nervous, but excited at the same time.

The school principal, Dr. Michael Almeida, said this is a common emotion. He said many of the students had expressed similar sentiments to him as well. Overall, he said he was extremely pleased at how smoothly operations were running yesterday morning and how excited the kids appeared.

He also said commingling the students "has never been a problem." He said once inside the building the students are completely divided, but as they arrived for the start of their first day of school, they all clustered outside the building with bused students gathering at the rear of the building and dropped-off students gathering at the front entrance.

"Our seventh and eighth grade students display role model behavior that the sixth grade students just follow from watching them and before you know it, we have a school-wide culture," Almeida said.

The elementary schools were not free from transitions either. Many of the students arriving at Tiogue Elementary School yesterday morning were there as first-time students even though they were entering third, fourth or fifth grade.
