## Pajama drive aims keep cold nights a little warmer for the needy

"This is the first time we've done this and we're doing it through the Alan Shawn Feinstein Good Deeds Program," she said.

"I decide to have the Hopkins Hill Pajama Drive with donations going to a local chapter of 'One Million Good Nights.'

The Pajama Program, founded in 2001, provides new pajamas for those in need nation-wide, many of whom live in group shelters, temporary housing or are shuffled from one place to another, according to pajamaprogram.org.

Many of these children have never enjoyed the simple comfort of a new pair of pajamas.

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said the goal is 150 pairs.

"The kids announce it during the morning messages, practicing their public speaking skills and have made posters that have been hung throughout the school and have gone room to room taking collections," she said. "It's so cute to see

So far, 27 pairs have been collected and students will be collecting until the end of February. They have to be brand new and donations are being accepted for all ages, from newborns to adults.
