Hopkins Hill feeds families for Thanksgiving

Students, community gather more than 1,200 canned goods for annual holiday food drive

COVENTRY — The students, families, faculty and staff at Hopkins Hill will be giving away an impressive 27 Thanksgiving baskets this year as part of their annual Thanksgiving Food Drive. The school was able to collected over 1,200 canned goods and had plenty of help from the community.

According to Kim O'Connell, a

grade four teacher at Hopkins Hill Elementary, this year they will be distributing its highest number of baskets yet in the history of the longrunning food drive tradition at the school.

"We started out maybe a week and a half to two weeks ago as part of our Feinstein Good Deeds Program," said O'Connell.

Each class was assigned a different item to bring in for the food drive, and when combined the

school was able to use the items to stuff 27 baskets and have enough left over to go to the Coventry Food Bank.

O'Connell said the drive was truly a community effort. The family of one of the students at the school won a turkey and basket and donated it to the drive, First Student bus service donated six baskets and turkeys, Brookdale Senior Living Solutions provided three baskets and turkeys, Washington Oak

Elementary and Alan Shawn Feinstein Middle School provided 8 baskets and turkeys total, and Stop and Shop on Tiogue Ave donated 15 turkeys. Dave's Supermarket donated \$500 which the staff used to stock the baskets with extras like butter, pie, fruit, veggies and other fresh

"With the \$500 we bought everything for a Thanksgiving meal," O'Connell said. "We will use what is leftover for Christmas."

O'Connell coordinated the donations and baskets and said Hopkins Hill School Nurse Diane Kowal did most of the shopping.

"It's just a very generous community we have here," said O'Connell. "Our families don't always have but they still give."

As part of their Feinstein Good Deeds Program, Alan Shawn Feinstein will match the school \$1
