ASFMS students travel to D.C. for national NEED Conference



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COVENTRY — Students at Alan Shawn Feinstein Middle School in Coventry returned from a Washington D.C. trip this week for the 38th annual National Energy Education Development (NEED) Youth Energy Conference and Award ceremony, where they won the award of Rhode Island Junior Rummer Up for their project "Collaboration with the Coventry Community through the NEED Project."

For the past two years students at ASFMS have been dedicated to educating students, staff and other members of the Coventry community about long-term sustainable actions to make sure there's enough energy to meet today's needs. According to teachers Anne Marie Printer, Jennifer Pietros and Linda Grandchamp, the students have displayed citizenship through increasing community awareness of the importance of reducing energy consumption.

On Friday, June 22 the conterence involved challenges where students were asked to address real world problems. Saturday involved an Energy STEM Student Presentation block and teacher workshop. On Monday, June 25 students received their awards. The remainder of the trip was spent visiting famous landmarks and historical sites.

"They did a lot of energy workshops where they had to take a school and make it net zero energy usage," said Printer. "Putting solar panels on the roof, shrubbery, using geo thermal energy. They had to figure out how to make a school in Mexico more energy efficient."

Other 2018 NEED Conference award winners include West Warwick High School, which took home National Senior Rookie of the Year, and Western Coventry Elementary School, which was a National Elementary Finalist under teacher Kerri Luchka. Students who attended the conference met peers from around the country.

"There were kids from Kentucky,
