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their time to help coordinate the baskets and distribute them to families on Monday afternoon. The sisters were shuffling through the school hallways this week sorting the canned goods, organizing the turkeys and checking off items on their lists.

"We're just helping to bring people in and get them their food and then carry it to their cars," said Elizabeth. "It's great and I think people really appreciate it."

"It's nice to be able to help others,"

said Abigail.

According to D'Aleno, the Tiogue Thanksgiving Food Drive is a tradition more than 20 years in the making, starting with another faculty member years ago who has since retired. D'Aleno then signed on to take the reigns and carry on the tradition.

"What's so great about it is the whole school gets involved to give back to the community," she said. "The kids learn that being thankful could be as simple as one canned good - that you can make a difference with one item. One can of peas can make all the difference."

"It's such a great way to show them that you can do one small thing and make an impact on a lot of people," she added.

This will be the first local food drive for Tiogue Elementary Principal Domenic Giusti, who is in his first year overseeing the school. He said he is proud of the efforts and the school's overall "spirit of volunteerism."

"It is such a giving community," Giusti said. "Our faculty and staff dedicate themselves to families in so many ways. When we asked for donations they were bringing items into school on day one. It is a pleasure to work with consummate professionals who truly embody the word 'selfless.' Our parent volunteers and families that donated are absolutely amazing."

The effort is part of the school's work as a Feinstein Leadership School.

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
