A Collaboration of Teachers, **Professors, School Districts and** Unions File a Lawsuit to Challenae **Trump's Executive Order to Dismantle the Department of** Education

The American Federation of Teachers ioined with other educators, school districts, and unions filed suit against the Trump administration to stop the mass firings that threaten essential educational services at the Department of Education. "The dismantling of the Department has beaun via mass lavoffs of at least half of the entire Department. Prior to January 20, 2025, the Department employed 4,133 employees. After the Trump administration's recent actions, just 2,183

will remain." This lawsuit is led by Democracy Forward and argues that elimninating the department would harm students, particularly those with disabilities, lowincome backgrounds, and English learners.

This executive order seeks to close the Department of Education and shift responsibilities to different federal agencies that lack the expertise in handling these critical services. Union leaders, like Randi Weingarten, warn that this decision will disproportionally impact vulnerable students, reduce access to affordable higher education, and eliminate needed funding for public schools. They contend that President Trump is prioritizing tax cuts for the wealthy over providing the necessary economy. The lawsuit highlights that Congress has consistently funded and mandated the department's programs for nearly 50 years.

"The Department of Education, and the laws it is supposed to execute, has one major purpose: to fill opportunity gaps to help every child in America succeed," said AFT President Randi Weingarten.



Our Billionaire President Cuts the Wages of Hundreds of Thousands of Workers

President Trump recently rescinded an executive order from the Biden administration that raised the minimum wage for federal contractors to \$15 an hour. Given that this order was adjusted to inflation, the wage was increased to \$17.75 since then. This is a direct attack on the livelihoods of hundreds of thousands of lowwage workers-such as janitors and food service staff. Although the Trump administration still needs formally to overturn the rule, it will allow employers to cut wages knowing that there is no enforcement.

If the Trump administration fully eliminates the higher minimum wage for federal contractors, those workers-unless protected by a higher state minimum wage-will be forced to earn the federal minimum of \$7.25 per hour, a rate that has remained unchanged since 2009. This rollback would slash wages for full-time federal contractors by nearly 60%, costing them approximately \$22,000 per year. (It's important to note that all workers, not just federal contractors, deserve a higher minimum wage, but only Congress has the power to enact a nationwide increase-the president can only set wages for federal contractors.)

The move is perceived to benefit large government contractors by reducing their costs rather than labor increasing government efficiency. Trump has also suggested other superficial policies, like eliminating taxes on tips, which critics argue serve to further benefit employers rather than genuinely aid workers. This pattern highlights Trump's tendency to use proworker language while taking actions that funding so all children may succeed in our hurt low-wage workers, suggesting a primary focus on boosting profits for corporations.





Tell Congress: No Cuts To Education

The Trump administration's plan to gut federal support for public schools and give tax cuts to billionaires at the expense of loans for students to make college affordable and health care services for those who need it the most (including disabled children) sends a terrible, symbolic message.

Ending support for federal education programs would mean:

- Eliminating funding for lowincome children in rural, suburban and urban areas.
- No services for kids with disabilities denying them their right to a free and appropriate education.
- Gutting career and technical education programs nationally.
- Cutting access to Pell Grants

Those are not the solutions families voted for.
